Thanks to many generous gifts and well-planned investments, BCF now manages a total of 8 scholarship funds that have generated over \$3.1M.



Brookline is home to a uniquely diverse and ambitious youth population, and the Brookline Community Foundation (BCF) plays a special role in supporting its success. The good news: A large majority of Brookline High School graduates matriculate to college, putting themselves on track to access high-skilled careers. The challenge: As college costs continue to rise, low- and moderate-income households cannot keep up. Typical needbased financial aid packages do not cover the full cost burden for students and their families. Other types of scholarships, meanwhile, tend to widen rather than close racial and economic inequities among collegegoers.

Community foundations are well-positioned to address inequities in college access by directing local dollars to the students with the greatest financial need.

HOW BCF SCHOLARSHIPS BRIDGE THE GAP

For most students with financial need, federal grants and other scholarships only cover a portion of their total costs, leaving the rest to be covered by loans or family contributions. The BCF Scholarship Funds help to reduce that gap with need-based awards that make a college degree more affordable.
